## Welcame to our March newsletter

Being in school is important to your child's achievement, wellbeing, and wider development. Every moment in school counts, and days missed add up quickly.
The higher a pupil's attendance, the more they are likely to learn, and the better they are likely to perform in exams and formal assessments.

Data from 2019 shows that $84 \%$ of Key Stage 2 pupils who had $100 \%$ attendance achieved the expected standard, compared to $40 \%$ of pupils who were persistently absent across the key stage.

## Jubilee's statistics.....

Persistent absentees (less than 90\%)
This table shows the number of children who have an attendance below $90 \%$ this academic year:

This shows that 37 pupils across the school are classed as being persistently absent and is a cause for concern. These families/children may have already received a referral to the Education Welfare Service or may be receiving one shortly.
Children who are registered at a school but regularly fail to turn up are officially referred to as being 'persistently' or 'severely' absent.
The school day is split into two sessions - one session counts as a morning or afternoon spent in school. Pupils who have missed more than 10 percent of school sessions are considered persistently absent.

## Punctuality Matters

We have noticed that the children and parents/carers are trying really hard to reduce the number of late marles they are getting which is fantastic news.

It is important to be on time at the start of each day as the start of school is used to give out instructions or organise work. If your child is late they can miss work, time with their class teacher getting vital information, cause disruption to the lesson for others, and it can be upsetting for them leading to possible further absence.

School starts promptly, see below times -

- classroom doors open at 8.15 am
- classroom doors close at 8.30 am
- Late arrivals report to the school office with a parer/carer

Arrival after 8.45 am is recorded as unauthorised absence. If children are regularly late, a parent will be expected to attend a meeting to discuss this further.
